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EDITORIAL 1942.

The School Association representatives decided that two copies of this record of the school's activities for 1942 should be made, one for filing purposes, the other for the library.

In this, the precedent of 1941 was followed, and the paper-pulp normally used for the school magazine was saved.

The Association also decided that foundation prizes only should be awarded this year and that certificates should be given instead of the customary school prizes.

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MISS ADA PARTRIDGE.

On November 18th, 1942, a very solemn assembly gathered in the quadrangle to do honour to the memory of Miss Partridge, whose death had taken place that morning.

When Miss Partridge left Fort St. over twenty-two years ago, she had been its Head-Mistress for twenty-five years. Her career was especially identified with our school, for she was a pupil here till she passed her entrance-examination into the Public Service in 1877; later, in 1881, she took a course of special training at Fort St. Training College and soon afterwards returned to teach at Fort St. Infants' School.

In 1895, when the Fort St. Model Public School was created, she became its first Head-Mistress, and held this position till the re-organisation of the State High Schools in 1912, when she was made the first Head-Mistress of our present school, an office which she held till her retirement.

That occasion was marked by a public farewell at the Conservatorium Hall on 30th April, 1920; a crowded gathering, presided over by the late Hon. Augustus James, K.C., and attended by Mr. T. Mutch, the Minister for Education, Mr. P. Board, Director of Education, the late Mr. W. Elliott, Chief Inspector of Secondary Schools, and many other notable citizens, indicated the esteem in which she was held.

During the many years of her retirement she maintained her keen interest in the school's activities, and was always a welcome guest at its functions.

Her memory will be perpetuated in the richest prize which the school offers - the Ada Partridge Prize - founded, in her honour, at the time of her retirement.

The two minutes' silence observed by this year's pupils symbolises the respect in which she has been held by many ^{pupils} years through ~~the many~~ years.

PRESENTATION OF LIFE-SAVING AWARDS

THE LEAVING CERTIFICATE EXAMINATIONS RESULTS 1941.

Sixty-nine girls passed the Leaving Certificate in 1941. Of these, Dorothy Fitzpatrick obtained 3 Honours (First Class) and 2 A s. Patricia Stubbin obtained 2 Honours (Second Class) and 4 A s. Patricia Knight obtained 2 Honours (First), 1 Honour (second) 1A and 1B. Marcia Petterson obtained 1 Honour (First), 1 Honour (Second), 3A s. Betty Lippmann obtained 1 Honour (First), 4 A s and 1 B. Evelyn Swann obtained 1 Honour (First), 3A s and 2B s. Marion Pavel obtained 2 Honours (Second), 1A and 3B s. Alison King obtained 1 Honour (Second) and 5A s.

TWENTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FORT STREET HIGH SCHOOL OLD
GIRLS' UNION. March 1942.

The Committee of the Fort St. High School Girls' Old Girls' Union has much pleasure in presenting to its members the twenty-second Annual Report for the year ending March, 1942.

Membership totals 332; 303 Ordinary and 29 Life Members.

The Literary Circle, a sub-society of the Union has been active during the year and will present its own report to this meeting. The Choir, owing to the illness of Mrs. James and the war activities of the members, did not function this year.

The Annual Dinner was the major attraction of the year. It was held at the Women's Club on 15th October. After the dinner a very delightful musical programme was given. The present girls of the school were very generous with their gift of red roses for this function.

Arrangements were made to have the Annual Ball at the Trocadero on Friday, 19th May, but owing to a change in the plans of the Trocadero this had to be cancelled. A suggestion was made that the Ball be held at a later date at some other ballroom, but a decision was made against this as the numbers for attendance were too low.

Other functions held during the year were three theatre parties, which proved very popular, a Travel Night held at the Vacuum Oil Theatrette and a "Back-to-School" Night. The Travel Night proved very interesting. It was given to us entirely free by the Vacuum Oil Co. Pty. Ltd., and the programme consisted of beautiful travelogues and interesting newsreels. We made an admission charge and were able to give the whole of the proceeds to the School Patriotic Fund.

The "Back-to-School" Night was very popular and a suggestion was made that one be held every year.

In July the School held its annual fete and the Old Girls' Union has a Miscellaneous Stall. The fete was to be held at the school, but Rushcutters Bay Oval, but owing to rain, it was held at the school.
