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CHANGES IN THE STAFF, 1942-1943.

At the end of 1942 the following staff transfers occurred:

Miss Weddell, Deputy-Principal in 1942, went to West Maitland as Head Mistress. She had , prior to 1941, during which year she was Deputy Head at Newcastle Girls' High School, been Modern Language Mistress at Fort St.

Her promotion broke a long and valued association with the school which deeply regretted her departure. Her place, both as Deputy and Modern Language Mistress, was taken by Miss Gombert.

The school suffered another loss in the retirements of Mrs Ryan and Mrs James.

Mrs Ryan came to the school in 1919 as Miss Slattery, and at the time of her retirement had been continuously at Fort St. for a longer period than any other member of the staff, having served under Miss Partridge, Miss Cruise and Miss Cohen. During this long period her unfailing courtesy, efficiency and charm were deeply appreciated by her ~~class~~ colleagues and pupils. Her place was taken by Miss Arter from Taree.

Mrs James had also had a long association with the school. During her eleven years with us, both staff and pupils could always count on her great generosity and benefit by her fine artistry, both in music and painting.

Since Mrs James's retirement at the end of February, Miss A. Smith has been Music Mistress; during her long illness this term, Miss M. Taylor has visited us to give instruction in singing.

Miss Nichol and Miss Wingrove, both of whom had been on the staff for many years, were transferred to Parramatta High School and St. George High School respectively.

Mrs Wane, who was transferred to Homebush Junior High School, was replaced by Miss Robson, who was with us for a short time during First Term; during her illness Mrs Ryan returned to give war-time service for.

Second Term, when she finally retired. Miss B. Adlem then came to us from Hornsby Girls' High School. Miss Kerr also came from Hornsby to take the place of Miss Nichol.

The place of Miss Llewellyn, who joined the A.W.A.S. last year, was taken by Miss Pollard.

Miss Olive has come as a part-time teacher of physical training, and Miss Naughton has joined the staff as School Counsellor.

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SPECIAL PRIZE WINNERS.

The Ada Partridge Prize, awarded for the best pass in the Leaving Certificate, 1942, was won by Joan Meredith, as were the Annie E. Turner Prize for the best pass in English and History at the Leaving Certificate, 1942, and the Old Girls' Literary Circle Prize, awarded for the best pass in English at the same examination.

Joan Meredith won a distinguished Leaving Certificate pass, obtaining First Class Honours in Latin (first place in the State), in English (first place in the State among female candidates, two equal) and French. She also won the Sir Daniel Levy Medal, awarded annually to the candidate who obtains the best general pass including Honours in English. This is the second year in which the medal has been presented, and Joan is the first girl to obtain it.

The Weston Memorial Prize, awarded for the best pass in Mathematics at the Leaving Certificate, 1942, was won by Dorothy Pollitt.
